



Dr. GLEN T. HVENEGAARD

Dr. Glen T. Hvenegaard, a world-renowned scientist in the field of Environmental Science, is presently working as an Associate Professor of Geography and Environmental Studies at Augustana University College in Camrose, Alberta, Canada.

Dr. Hvenegaard was selected by the World Scientists Forum for "Eminent Scientist of the Year 2003" international award of IRPC in the field of tourism based on his contributions in ecotourism, nature conservation and research excellence in Environmental Science.

Dr. Hvenegaard is the coordinator and advisor for the Environmental Studies and Environmental Science programs. Dr. Hvenegaard earned his Ph.D. from the University of Victoria and his B.Sc. and M. Sc. from the University of Victoria. Dr. Hvenegaard teaches a variety of courses in environmental studies and physical geography and a field course to the wilderness in northern Canada. Previously, he worked as a park warden, consultant, and park naturalist.

Dr. Hvenegaard is a member of the World Commission on Protected Areas and is a Fellow of LEAD International (Leadership for Environment and Development). He has received numerous honors, including the Elaine Burke Award, Action 21 Environmental Achievement Award, and Young

Canadian Researchers Award.

Dr. Hvenegaard's research concentrates on the role of ecotourism in conservation, with a focus on protected areas, bird watching, whale watching, and wildlife festivals. He also conducts research on

environmental education and the influence of habitat change on forest songbirds. Dr. Hvenegaard has numerous publications, including 8 peer-reviewed articles, 5 book chapters, 2 monographs, and 41

professional reports and popular articles. Dr. Hvenegaard has received research grants from many funding agencies. Dr. Hvenegaard has attended over 45 conferences in Canada and around the world, including New Zealand, Belize, Brazil, Russia, and Thailand.

Dr. Hvenegaard is married to Pam Stacey, a marine mammal researcher and university instructor and has two boys-Carson and Leif. Dr. Hvenegaard enjoys bird watching, nature study, hiking, and skiing.
